Subp. 2. State parks.

Collecting or possessing naturally occurring plants in a fresh state in state parks is prohibited, except that edible fruit and mushrooms may be harvested for personal, noncommercial use.

That means you can't dig anything up (so no roots or tubers) or take stalks, leaves, or flowers (so cattails and greens are out). This is so you don't harm the plant. But if it's a fruit, berry, or mushroom, you can gather what you need for your personal use.

You can not sell what you gather.
