Members Only Woodland Tour

Minnehaha Park Sunday, May 16, 1:00 - 3:00 pm

Erik Olsen, MLA, Native Landscape Designer with Out Back Nursery/Tennant Landscaping, Inc. will lead a members only woodland tour of Minnehaha Park. Erik will share his insights about observing how various native plants have adapted to the existing light, moisture, and soil conditions and applying these observations to help us design our own garden spaces.

The tour will start by the pergolas and wildflower gardens, between the Stevens house and the falls. We will then proceed down the stairs, and follow the creek for a short distance to the historic Bladdernut stand, where several varieties of woodland wildflowers are located. We will then cross the creek and follow the path to view large patches of trillium, bloodroot, woodland sedges, and ferns. Metered parking (50 cents/hour) is available in this area of Minnehaha Park.

To-Do List for Gardeners

May

- Weed by hand for 15 minutes per day. Remove dandelions, quack grass, clover etc. Remove unwanted small seedling trees before they become too established.
- Water newly planted seedling grasses and wildflowers during drier periods.
- Cut off dried flower stems of spring blooming wildflowers (Examples; wild columbine, wild geranium, prairie smoke, pussytoes, alumroot etc.) (optional)
- Add shredded wood mulch to garden areas if needed (3-4" depth). (optional)
- Hummingbird feeder(s) can be put back in use.

June

- Cut off dried flower stems of spring blooming wildflowers (Examples; wild columbine, wild geranium, prairie smoke, pussytoes, alumroot etc.) (optional)
- Water newly planted seedling grasses and wildflowers during drier periods.
- Weed by hand for 15 minutes per day. Remove dandelions, quack grass, crabgrass clover etc. Usually by mid-June, most of the weeds in the garden have greatly diminished.

July

- Cut asters back to ½ their height. This
 promotes the plants to grow more
 densely and with more blooms.
 (Examples: new england aster.
 smooth aster, sky blue aster, silky
 aster, white upland aster) (optional)
- Water newly planted seedling grasses and wildflowers during drier periods.
- Weed by hand for 15 minutes per day. Remove crabgrass, dandelions, quack grass, clover etc. Usually by mid-June, most of the weeds in the garden have greatly diminished.

Open daily April 1 - October 15 from 7:30 am until one half hour before sunset. No entry fee, but pay parking

· April & May: bloodroot, wild ginger, trilliums, marsh marigolds and other spring ephemerals in the woodland. June & July: ladyslippers, irises, and turtleheads in the wetland. Mid-late summer: asters, black-eved susans, blazing stars and goldenrods, big bluestem and other prairie grasses in the prairie. Many staff led programs.

Lost Valley Prairie SNA (Scientific and Natural Area)

www.dnr.state.mn.us/snas From the Twin Cities, go south on US Hwy 61, north on MN 95, east on Co Rd 78 to Nyberg Avenue, then 1/2 mile north on Nyberg; park is at the end of the road.

 On 200 acres there are native grasses little bluestem, prairie drop-seed, side-oats grama, hairy grama, Indian grass, and big bluestem. One of the few state locations to find rock sandwort. Summer prairie wildflowers, including prairie smoke, puccoon, bird's foot violets, yellow

star grass, blue-eyed grass, and beard-tongue

Bennett/Johnson Prairie

Entry fee \$7 · Wide variety of natives on areas of tallgrass prairie, oak savanna, and a prairie pothole or wet prairie. Reconstructed prairie; self-guided tours, staff and volunteer-led tours

Wolsfeld Woods SNA (Scientific and Natural Area)

From Long Lake 0.5 mi N on Brown Rd to Co Hwy 6. Park in the Trinity Lutheran church parking lot. www.dnr.state.mn.us/snas

· Spring: trilliums, hepatica, bloodroot, and dutchman's breeches. Fall: outstanding color in large, mature stand of hardwoods, including red oak, ironwood, butternut, maple, elm, and basswood. Over 220 acres: visitors required to stay on marked trails. No dogs allowed.
