April 20th program:

Tips and Techniques for Safe Transfer and Sharing of Native Plants Julia Vanatta

Tips for managing our gardens to protect them from unwanted guests, more importantly to be certain we don't accidentally share any invasive species with another gardener.

After the April presentation, Julia and Wild Ones Education Committee will host several **demonstration works sessions**, limit of 6 persons per session. More information on dates and locations will be available mid April on our website.

These works sessions are intended to help us learn together as the bare root process is quite new for many of us. Participants will be asked to volunteer to help train others while also collecting data on experiments in their own gardens. We hope our chapter can embrace this study and help the greater Twin Cities market by establishing best practices.

Some of the questions we are hoping to answer through experimentation include:

- Which plants are easy to bare root and which need more kid glove treatment?
- How much does time of year affect transplants when a plant is not in dormancy?
- Which plants can sustain a week or so without getting planted and which need to get put into soil immediately?
- Are there any tricks that help maintain a plant's viability?
- Do we need to wash roots or can we just brush off excess dirt, reserving soil microbes a plant may need to survive?
- If a plant needs to include soil to remain viable, how long should it be isolated to be sure no worm cocoons or live baby worms were in the container?
